

Iron Chef Camporee

US Coast Guard Station, Telegraph Road, Alexandria, Virginia,
October 17-19, 2008

1. CAMPOREE PROGRAM

Camporees are designed to be part of the youth outdoor experience and as such necessarily contain elements that support the Eight Methods of Scouting. Features such as patrol-based operations, inter-patrol, inter-troop competitions and the opportunity for skills instruction are all part of the basic Boy Scout outdoor program.

It is critical that these events be structured so that the youth perceive the competition as fair — these events are for the youth and adults should not participate or otherwise place themselves in competition with the youth. The correct role for adult leaders is before the Camporee — this is when they can help their troop and patrols prepare for the competitions by learning and practicing the skills required.

To be sure, the adults want to have fun as well. We suggest that adults be allowed to compete in events as patrols of adults in competition against other patrols of adults.

1.1 Overview

The purpose of this Camporee is to provide a safe, fun-filled activity for the members of the Colonial District. The theme for this Camporee is “Iron Chef – Colonial, The Camporee.” The program’s focus will be on Camp Kitchen Skills. The methods that the program will utilize to reinforce these skills will include teaching, training and competition. Skills may include Camp Kitchen Hygiene, Fire Building, Menu Development, Fire and Stove Safety Safe handling of Food, Cooking skills, etc.

1.2 Sponsorship

The idea for, and successful operation of, this Iron Chef Camporee is the result of a partnership between the Colonial District of the National Capital Area Council, Boy Scouts of America, The Corporate Sponsor of “The Secret Ingredient” and the US Coast Guard Station, Telegraph Road

1.3 Method

The Scouting Method provides the overall guidance for the Colonial District training approach to the Camporee program. In all instances the emphasis will be on boys leading and teaching Cooking and related skills and ethics to other boys

1.4 WEBELOS SCOUTS

A concurrent Webelos-Ree for all Webelos I and II will be held at a separate area within the Camporee location Saturday to Sunday, Oct. 18-19, for Webelos, leaders, and adult family members/parents/guardians only. The theme is “Passport to Boy Scouting” and there will be activity badge, Scoutcraft skills, and advancement stations.

Leaders should arrange for their dens to arrive early on Saturday morning. Upon entering the USCGS front gate, take an immediate left and follow the Webelos (not Camporee) signs. Den sites will be assigned, fees will be collected based on number of Webelos and adults, and a Passport for each Webelos will be issued. Units must have in their possession a completed PERMISSION/MEDICAL FORM (below) for each Webelos; Webelos are welcome to participate just for the day but are encouraged to camp overnight.

Packs should preregister (form below) with Llarna Burnett, burnettlg@yahoo.com, 703 624-0158, by October 8. The preregistration numbers are not binding for the calculation of fees and late

registrations will be accepted, but it is important to preregister in order to ensure there will be enough tent space, Passports, and patches. The fee is **\$9.00** for both Webelos and adults and is due whether a person is there for the day or overnight.

Webelos are required to camp only at the Webelos-Ree site and all adult supervision requirements for Webelos activities apply. Webelos dens are responsible for their own meals and patrol cooking is recommended. No ground fires are permitted; propane or liquid fuel stoves are permitted as long as all safety concerns are met; **charcoal grills are currently not permitted but this may change;** Leave No Trace requirements apply.

Leaders should arrange for their Webelos to visit a troop for Saturday dinner and the campfire, under adult leader supervision. Webelos are encouraged to visit, but may not participate in, the Camporee and must be under adult leader supervision at all times. An ideal Saturday morning activity is to visit Jamboree on the Air; with den leader preparation, Webelos can earn Communicator activity badge and Communicating belt loop.

Limited parking is available at the Webelos-Ree. Webelos can offload gear at the tent site and do not have to backpack in; no vehicles can remain parked at the tent site. Separate rest room facilities for adult males and females only are available at the Webelos-Ree site; portable toilets are for Webelos. Water is available on site; there are no sinks or wash basins; each den must carry its trash out. All camporee rules, procedures and guidance apply to Webelos.

1.5 All Scouts

The program will be broken into two sessions, the AM Program and the PM Program.

The AM program will be open to all Scouts, all Ranks, Scout through Eagle. The AM Program will provide instruction in Camp Kitchen Skills. Instruction and Competition in this Session will be conducted at the Patrol Level. Patrols will move from station to station. Each station will provide instruction in a basic Camp Kitchen Skill. At the completion of the Instruction the Patrol will be asked to demonstrate that they have learned the skill. The exhibition will be hands on demonstration

that the skill has been learned. The Patrols will be scored on their knowledge of the skill taught through the use of pre-established score sheets. The Patrols will rotate from station to station within their sub camp program area. At the end of the morning program session the scores for each Patrol will be tallied. To determine the highest Scoring Troop for the morning session, the score for each Troop will be an average of the patrol Scores. A Troop with 4 Patrols will have their patrol Scores totaled and divided by 4 to determine the Troop's average score. The patrols competing are expected to be true, standing Patrols and not a Patrol that has been formed only for this event.

The PM program will be the Iron Chef Cook Off in which each Troop has to prepare a diner entre. There are only two methods of cooking permitted in the competition – Dutch oven or one pot stove top. Each Troop will put together a Team of 4 Scouts to compete in the afternoon Cook Off. The Teams will report to their Area's Camporee Commissary to shop for the ingredients that will go into the diner entrée. The order in which a Team will shop will be determined by the Scores from the AM Program. The highest score shops first and then in order based on the scores highest to lowest. Once all Teams have completed their shopping a secret ingredient will be issued to each Team. The secret ingredient has to be used in the entrée. The Cook Off will be a timed event from start of preparation to completion of clean up. Once all entrée's are complete they will be judged on an area by area basis. With the highest rated entrée from each area advancing to the Top Chef round of the competition. The Top Chef Round will determine the overall Top Chef winner for the Camporee and the Second and Third Place winners. The Entrée's will be judged on best use of ingredients, best overall taste, presentation, time and cleanliness of the team's food prep area. Points will, be deducted for coaching and any assistance provided by unit adults during the competition. Once the Judges have completed their work and scored all the entrée's, each entrée will be made available for all Camporee attendees to sample a spoonful.

1.6 New, Tenderfoot & 2nd Class Scout PM Program

Instruction aimed at the Tenderfoot Scout through First Class Scout skills set, will be part of the

afternoon program. This program area will provide the standard “new boy” Scoutcraft skills advancement Scouts and Scouters have come to expect from the Fall Camporee. The focus will be on demonstration of Woods tools knowledge including but not limited to Axe yard setup, proper use of woods tools and other Scoutcraft skills that focus on the theme of the camporee.

1.7 Older Scout Skills Activity/ Instruction

The PM Program for Older Scouts that are not assigned to their Troop’s Top Chef Competition Team will have three activities for the afternoon. The first will be to build a LNT Dutch oven fire pan. The materials for this project will be provided by the District. The finished projects will be for each unit to keep and to use as their own, on future outings. The second activity will be a Service project. The third activity will be to visit the Jamboree on the Air that will be taking place on the Camporee grounds. Jamboree on the Air will be operating all day Saturday for Scouts and Webelos. Each Scout or Webelo will be able to use the Radio with the assistance of a licensed operator and speak with people nationwide and worldwide. Certificates will be handed out certifying the Scout or Webelos participation. Also, information will be available on how to get participation patches.

1.8 Junior Leader Training Workshop

JLTW will not be offered at this Camporee

1.9 Learning and Training Materials

The learning and training materials for the program will be the BSA Handbook the BSA Guide to Safe Food Handling, The BSA Field Guide, and The Cooking Merit Badge Pamphlet.

1.10 Camporee-Wide Service Project

A service project is planned as part of the program. This will not only provide a good turn. The service project will take place on Saturday afternoon. At the conclusion of the PM phase of the program the training crew at each learning area (including scouts in the New Scout area) will lead the units assigned to a pre-assigned area where the service project will take place. Units should assure that all scouts have work gloves. In addition, each unit should bring the following tools: shovel (1), spade (1), bow saw (2) rake (2), and pruning shears (2).

1.11 Religious Services

Religious service will take place Sunday Morning and will start at 8:15 AM; it will be immediately followed by the closing ceremony.

1.12 Order of the Arrow Activities

Friday night: There will be an OA Chapter meeting at the headquarters area before the leaders’ meeting at 9:00 PM. All OA members are welcome to attend. Cracker barrel will be served — this is a great opportunity to meet the Chapter officers and share in some evening fellowship.

Saturday night the call-out of Brotherhood

Candidates will take place at the campfire program.

Order of the Arrow Brotherhood: Youth and adult Ordeal members, who completed their ordeal before August 2007 and have paid their 2008 dues, are encouraged to participate in the Brotherhood ceremony. A sign-up sheet will be posted at the OA Headquarters; however, you may contact Kyle Hayden at kyle.hayden123@gmail.com in advance of the Camporee. For our LDS units that cannot stay Saturday evening, we will work with you directly, please contact Tony Moller tony@aroooo.com.

Interested Ordeal members must participate in the Brotherhood discussion Saturday afternoon and the Brotherhood walk Saturday night. The Discussion and Walk will take approximately 45-60 minutes each. Brotherhood Candidates should meet at the OA Headquarters at 6:30 PM (time may change based on final schedule) for the Discussion. The Walk and induction ceremony will take place Saturday night directly after the campfire. There is no cost for the Brotherhood sash; however, 2008 dues **must** be current — dues are \$12 and may be paid when registering for the Brotherhood conversion.

1.13 When and Where

The Fall Camporee will be held at the US Coast Guard Station on Telegraph Road. Directions and map are attached to this package.

Units should plan on arriving between 5:00 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. (the leaders’ meeting begins at 10:00 p.m.). Friday, October 17th and departing by 11:00 a.m. Sunday October 19th (the closing program will be held on Sunday at 8:15 a.m.) **Please do not arrive**

early Friday evening, because all campsites may not be marked. Parking is at a premium; carpooling is highly recommended and a Parent Drop off area will be provided. See section 2.2 for further information on parking.

1.14 Pre-Registration

Preregistration before October 8th is essential in order for the Camporee team to firm up logistic support requirements. Each sub camp will have its own Cooking learning area and will be assigned a service project. Assigning units to campsites and sub camps (and learning areas and service projects) will depend on preregistration numbers. If a unit fails to pre-register by the date listed above, that unit will be required to supplement the additional cost of the food not purchased for the competition. In addition, a member of each of those units will be required to go shop for the additional supplies on Saturday morning your pre-registration form should be mailed to:

Please be sure to include all of the information on the pre-registration form – No fees are expected with your pre-registration.

1.15 Registration & Fees

Fees include the ground fee, Scout insurance, a camporee patch, as well as Camporee supplies and materials. Camporee fee is **\$12.00** per attendee.

All payments should be made BY CHECK payable to NCAC-BSA on arrival at check-in. FINAL REGISTRATION details are included in Section 3.

All **STAFF FEES** are due by the Round Table before the Camporee. All **UNIT FEES** are due at check-in at the Camporee.

1.16 Troop Prep-work

In order to take full advantage of what this Camporee has to offer, Troops should review the key points of the Cooking merit badge booklet as part of the troop program. In addition, units should prepare for the cooking competition, as noted below.

TROOPS SHOULD DETERMINE IF THEY WILL BE USING A DUTCH OVEN OR A STOVE AND POT TO PREPARE THE COMPETITION ENTRE. EACH UNIT WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR PROVIDING THEIR OWN COOKING SET UP, DUTCH OVEN , MATCHES, CHARCOAL, STOVE, FUEL, POT, UTENSILS, CLEANING ITEMS, PREP TABLE, ETC. TROOPS MUST PROVIDE THEIR OWN LNT FIRE PAN IF THEY WILL BE USING A DUTCH OVEN AND CHARCOAL.

1.17 InterTroop Competition

This competition is the PM portion of the camporee as stated in section 1.6

2. GENERAL CAMPOREE INFORMATION

2.1 CHANGES and CANCELLATIONS

The Camporee Director is the only individual authorized to change or cancel a scheduled activity or event. Any necessary changes will be made at the earliest possible time and posted in writing at Camporee Headquarters.

2.2 Traffic Control and Parking

This Camporee is being held at the US Coast Guard Station property; all participants will be expected follow all traffic rules in effect at all times. All vehicles will be kept in the designated parking areas; there will be NO PARKING at the campsites. Troops are encouraged to car pool as much as possible and to arrange to have as few cars as

possible remain at the Camporee site. No cars will be allowed in the camping areas. All cars remaining at the Camporee may park only in designated areas. Trailers will have their own Parking Area and will be sent there at arrival.

In order to avoid problems, Scouters that arrive early must move their cars to the designated parking area as soon as possible in order to avoid later arrivals having to wait. **Remember a Scout is Courteous.** *If everyone remembers this, no matter what the weather does, we will have no parking problems!*

As Stated Throughout This Section, Units Will Not Be Able To Take Cars or Trailers to the Campsite. All Gear Must Be offloaded at the designated Trailer Parking and Carried In.

2.3 Two Deep Leadership and Youth Protection

National BSA policy requires that "Two registered adult leaders, or one adult and a parent of a participating Scout, one of whom must be at least 21 years of age or older, are required for all trips or outings. There are a few instances, such as patrol activities, when no adult leadership is required. Coed overnight activities require male and female adult leaders." National BSA policy also states "When staying in tents, no youth will stay in the tent of an adult other than his or her parent or guardian." It is the unit leader's responsibility to see that these policies are enforced within his/her unit. Questions or concerns should be directed to the Camporee director or to the District Executive.

2.4 How to Get There

Take Telegraph road to the US Coast Guard Station; if you are going north the station will be on your Right, if you are coming south, the station will be on your left.

2.5 Camping

All of the campsites will be located at US Coast Guard Station. Space will be tight so bring just the essentials needed for your unit to participate in the activities. Remember, this is an Iron Chef Camporee – the lighter your unit, the better. Late registering units may be camping in overflow areas and will be last in picking food at the commissary. Units should follow the Unit Campsite Layout

included in this package.

2.6 Camporee Food Service

Units are responsible for bringing their own food and the necessary means of preparing it. You will need food for Friday (or eat before you arrive), three meals Saturday and Sunday breakfast. Please observe BSA Leave No Trace guidelines. The afternoon activity will be the cooking competition in each of the sub camps and all food for that activity will be supplied by the Camporee, see section 1.17.

2.7 Parental Authorization

A Unit medical/permission form will be required for each Scout in attendance (sample attached). This form must be maintained at the unit campsite and accessible to the unit adult leaders at all times.

2.8 Emergency Contact

It is recommended that, if possible, units should have access to a cellular phone that could be used as a primary contact for members of their unit. The emergency numbers for the Camporee are 202-368-4030 (**Judi McCuistion**). **This is a cellular phone.** They are only to be used in case of an emergency. Anyone calling must know the individual's Troop number and, if possible, the unit leader's name.

2.9 First Aid

The First Aid Station will be located adjacent to the Camporee Headquarters Area and will be marked with a prominent sign. Units retain primary responsibility for health and safety matters; however, significant injuries must be brought to the First Aid station personnel for possible treatment and recording. If the injured person should not be moved from the site of the injury, a runner should be sent to the aid station immediately (see section 2.10). Any situation requiring contact with public emergency medical resource must be coordinated through the First Aid station personnel. More specific information will be provided at the Friday night leaders' meeting.

2.10 Fire & Ambulance Service

The local fire and police have been notified of our presence. In the unlikely event that fire or ambulance services are needed, send a runner to the Camporee Headquarters, so that an emergency call can be placed and the Camporee Director can be notified

immediately. If extraordinary circumstances require that an emergency call be placed from a cellular phone within your area, you should identify yourself as an adult Scouter calling from the Colonial District Camporee at the US Coast Guard Station. You still must send a runner to the Camporee Headquarters to notify the Camporee Director of the emergency and to arrange for the emergency equipment to be directed to the correct location.

EMERGENCY SERVICES (911) SHOULD BE CONTACTED ONLY THROUGH THE AID STATION, WHICH WILL COORDINATE GETTING FIRST AID PROFESSIONALS TO THE INJURED'S LOCATION

2.11 Paperwork

Units should prepare the following paperwork:

1. Colonial District Camporee registration form.
2. Youth Permission Form, units must have a form for each youth in attendance. **The unit maintains and retains these forms.** A sample of this is included in this package for your convenience;

3. REGISTRATION AND CHECK-OUT PROCEDURES

3.1 Registration and Check-In

All units planning on attending should register by October 8th (*see section 1.16*). These registration forms will be used by the staff in establishing remote parking needs, campsite locations and to determine how many boys will be participating in the various events. Units will also be assigned to campsites in sub-camps based on their geographic areas. Units that do not preregister must pay all fees at the Camporee **BEFORE** a site is assigned, *assuming any are still available*

Units should plan on arriving between 5:00 PM and 8:30 PM.

There will be a leader's meeting on Friday at 10:00 PM at the HQ area.

3.2 Campsite Assignment

For units that pre-register, their campsite assignment, a Camporee map, and any other

relevant Camporee information will be available at Headquarters when you check in. All other units will be assigned a site, on a space available basis. **You will need to get your site assignment and a map before you enter the camping area.**

3.3 Locating Your Site

A commissioner will help you find your site. The field will be divided into sub camps, one sub camp for each of the service areas in the District. Within each sub camp, unit sites will be individually marked. Follow the traffic control signs to the staging area. After you unload the gear, please move your car to the main parking lot. Units should follow the Unit Campsite Layout included in this package.

REMEMBER, NO VEHICLES WILL BE ALLOWED ONTO THE FIELDS.

3.4 Checking In and Paying Fees

After the unit has set up camp, one person (e.g., SPL, Assistant Scoutmaster, etc.) must go to the Camporee Headquarters to complete registration by turning in a completed registration form and paying all required fees (\$12.00 per Scout or Adult). To assist the staff, please pay with checks or money orders. These should be made payable to "NCAC-BSA." A single check or money order is the preferred method of payment.

3.5 Late Arrival & Early Departure

If a unit is not going to arrive during the designated arrival window on Friday night, please indicate this on your preregistration form. If your unit is going to leave before attending the closing ceremony on Sunday (8:15 a.m.), make sure you indicate this on the final registration form. If your unit must leave on Saturday evening, and you have notified the Administration Coordinator, you may obtain your patches and ribbons from your Campsite Commissioner after you have totally vacated your campsite and had the campsite commissioner sign the check out form. Units checking out Sunday see section 3.6.

3.6 Check-Out Procedures

Each unit will receive a checkout and program evaluation form with the final mailing or at registration. Additional copies will be available from the Campsite Commissioners. After you have

cleared your campsite of all units and personal gear, policed the area, send someone to notify your Commissioner. When the Commissioner arrives, he/she will inspect your camp, sign off on the check-out/evaluation form.

3.7 Camporee Patches, Awards & Ribbons

The distribution of Camporee patches, unit awards, and participation ribbons will be part of the closing ceremony on Sunday morning. They will not be available from Camporee Headquarters.

Ribbon And Patch Orders Are Placed Based On Pre-registration Numbers. If Your Unit Registers Late, They May Not Get The Patches at the event.

3.7 The Chairman's Award

The District Chairman will again present an award to recognize the Outstanding Troop or Crew at the Camporee. This award will be given to that unit which best exemplifies the aims and values of Scouting. Among the factors that will be considered are:

- Proper Food Handling.
- General Camping Skills
- Unit Health and Safety
- Unit Appearance
- Participation in the Service Project
- Participation in the Opening & Closing Ceremonies
- Participation in the Campfire

The Award will consist of a Certificate acknowledging the accomplishment and ribbon for the Unit flag. In addition, the winning Unit will also be given the honor of conducting the opening ceremony at the next Camporee.

4. CAMPING GUIDELINES

4.1 The Campground

As members of the Boy Scouts of America, it is our obligation and responsibility to see that every-one respect and observe the rules and regulations in this package and follows guidance provided by the Camporee directors and commissioners. Playing in the streams that run through the campground is prohibited. Remember the BSA **Leave No Trace** guidelines, all units are reminded to keep the impact of camping on the environment to a minimum. Be

sure to leave US Coast Guard Station in better shape than when you arrived!

4.2 Equipment

All troops are strongly urged to pack as lightly as possible for this event. Your unit should treat the Camporee as a **backpacking** event to the best of your unit's ability. The goal should be to carry everything they need in one trip from the vehicles.

The following are probably best left behind: Dutch Ovens, except the one needed for the competition, Weber-type grills, large chuck-boxes and, picnic tables. We will be camping on athletic fields at the station so we need to be as low impact as possible.

Unit vehicles will not have any access to the camping area.

4.3 Ground Conditions

The campground is fairly flat and campsites will be an open field. Protect your tents by bringing sturdy ground cloths and protect your body by bringing foam pads or air mattresses for a good night's rest. Backpacking dining flies are permitted. There will be no picnic tables available in the campground area. Remember, the park is a scarce resource. The ground cover is especially fragile in wet, rainy conditions and can take years to overcome the effects of harsh treatment. Please make every effort to minimize the impact of your unit's campsite and the common areas.

4.4 Natural Habitat

No trees, shrubs, or bushes will be cut within the campground or neighboring areas. Wood that has fallen from trees will be left in place. **Do not molest or interfere with the area's plant life or wildlife and do not play in the streams within the campground.**

4.5 Tent Ditching

There will be no tent ditching or other changes made to the ground contours to improve campsites. Remember that proper pitching of tents does not require ditching.

4.6 Cooking and Ground Fires

Units must bring their own stoves and fuel for cooking. Backpacking stoves are highly

recommended (small Coleman-type 2-burner stoves are acceptable. **GROUND FIRES ARE NOT PERMITTED.**

4.7 Use of Liquid Fuel

The safety of our Scouts and Scouters must be a prime consideration in the use of liquid fuels. The use of liquid fuels in lanterns and stoves is acceptable at this Camporee only if: 1) A knowledgeable adult provides supervision over the storage, transportation, and usage of the fuel; and 2) Scouts have been taught the safe and proper handling and usage of the fuel, stoves, and lanterns.

4.8 Availability of Water

Water will be available at a central location within the camping area, as well as the program areas. Carrying of water will be required. Canteens should be carried during the program on Saturday, as drinking water will not be readily available in the program areas. *Proper hydration is the key to keeping our Scouts healthy.* To avoid the serious consequences of dehydration, ensure everyone regularly consumes water, especially as they travel to and from program areas and while in the areas. Washing of dishes at the central water location is prohibited.

4.9 Latrines

Portable toilets will be available at convenient areas throughout the Camporee area. Please respect them and keep them clean. **DO NOT place trash, soft drink cans, or KP gray water in toilets.**

4.10 Trash

Every unit should bring a supply of plastic trash bags to securely bag and remove their own trash. A "Marked" Dumpster will be available at a central location for the participants use. **Please do not use the USCG or any construction dumpsters on the property.**

4.11 Campsite Inspections

The Campsite Commissioners will perform a health and safety inspection on Saturday. Units will be graded on good food handling practices, establishing a healthy campsite and providing a safe environment. Outstanding units will be recognized during the closing ceremony. The inspection forms the Commissioners will be using are included in this package as an attachment.

5. CAMPOREE RULES

5.1 Law of the Camporee

As in all Scouting activities, the Scout Oath and Law will be the ground rules of the Camporee. As with all outdoor events the BSA Leave No Trace guidelines also apply:

Plan Ahead And Prepare

Travel And Camp On Durable Surfaces

Pack It In, Pack It Out

Leave What You Find

Minimize Campfire Use

Respect Wildlife

Respect Others

Any individual who does not behave as he should may be putting his unit's future Camporee privileges in jeopardy and jeopardizing future use of the US Coast Guard Station. Units that do not comply with these rules will be asked to leave immediately.

5.2 HEALTH and SAFETY

The rules in the preceding paragraphs are for your health and safety. Please follow them and be careful. The Health and Safety Committee will be alert to safety hazards and unsafe activities throughout the Camporee. Please assist in the elimination of hazards or reckless acts as they are observed or brought to your attention.

5.3 Pick-Up Trucks

As stated in the Boy Scouts of America regulations Scouts may not ride in the back of pickup trucks. This rule will be strictly enforced at the camporee. It is the unit leaders' responsibility to assure that all Scouts are transported in safe vehicles with adequate seat belts.

5.4 Flames in Tents

Cooking or lighting with OPEN FLAMES of any kind is not allowed in any tent. Electric battery lanterns and flashlights are recommended.

5.5 Knives

Knives are tools. Any Scout or Scouter observed using a knife in an unsafe manner will have their knife confiscated and held for the remainder of the Camporee by a member of the Camporee staff.

5.6 Illegal Drugs, Alcoholic Beverages, and

Tobacco Products

Absolutely no illegal drugs, alcoholic beverages or tobacco products are allowed!

5.7 Firearms

Absolutely no firearms, pellet guns, BB guns, bow and arrows, or slingshots of any kind are allowed!

5.8 Fireworks

Absolutely no fireworks are permitted!

5.9 Proper Uniform

BSA Field Uniforms (Scout shirt and Scout pants or Scout shorts with proper socks) shall be worn for the Saturday night campfire and for the Religious Services. Points will be awarded during the Skills Competitions for Patrols with all members in troop or patrol Class B uniforms. **No military garb or fatigues, including camouflage, shall be worn.**

Both the **BSA Insignia Guide** (see the sitemap at <http://www.scouting.org> click on the Insignia Guide) and **Title 10, Subtitle A, Part II, Chapter 45, Section 771** prohibit wearing the uniform or a distinctive part of the uniform, of the Army, Navy, Air Force, or Marine Corps except as otherwise provided by law.

5.10 Discipline

Leaders will be responsible for the behavior of their Scouts at all times. Adult leaders, who are not helping in the events, should circulate through the events in which their Scouts are participating. Also, in past Camporees, pick-up ball games (both supervised and unsupervised) have become a source of injuries. Leaders are asked to discourage such games and urge boys to focus on Camporee activities. Sports equipment should not be brought to the Camporee. Radios, televisions and tape players shall be left at home.

5.12 Quiet Hours

All activities will be subject to quiet hours and lights out from 10:30 p.m. to 6:30 a.m. Leaders in each troop are responsible for enforcing quiet hours and lights out. Quiet hour behavior will be expected during religious services for all camporee attendees. **A Scout is Courteous.**

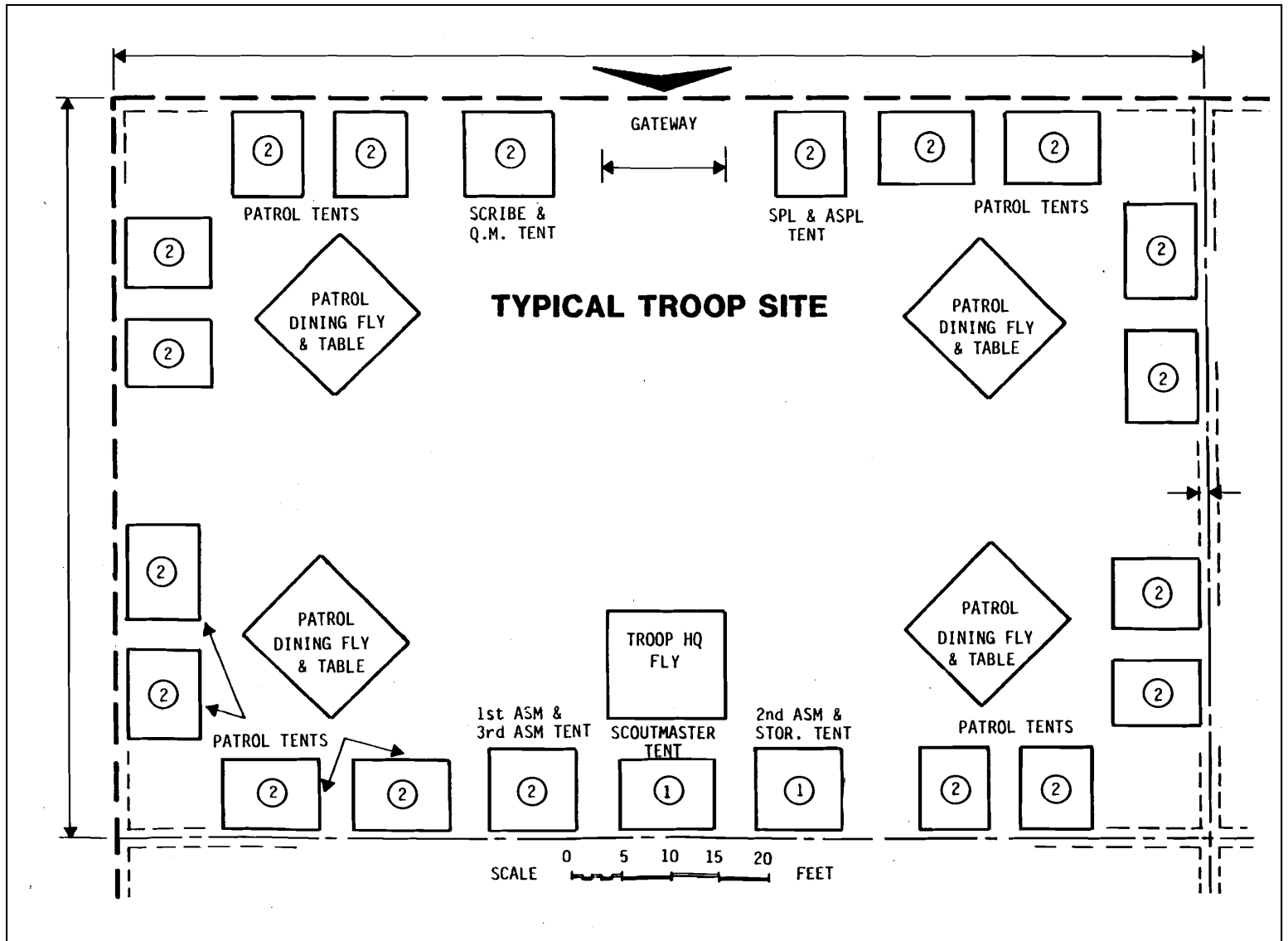
